












Thank You and Special Appeal

For Nicaraguans, this is the third year of crisis. Starting with the Uprising in April 2018, a series of events happened that marked all Nicaraguans in different ways. We have come to experience painful political processes; repression, violation of our most fundamental human rights such as free expression. Defending rights has become a crime that the state criminalizes and is paid for with imprisonment, harassment, and torture.

On top of that, the health crisis that brought on by the pandemic filled us with mourning and uncertainty. We now see a greater and growing economic crisis with food insecurity, an increase in violence in general, but a much more notable increase in gender violence. From January 1 to April 7, 19 femicides were registered, and 25 girls, boys and adolescents were orphaned due to this situation.

Despite being a people that carries much sadness, we still have dreams to fulfill, and we fight for them every day. In the rural communities of Troilo and Goyena, the children attend the Afterschool Program daily. Some arrive hungry, but with the hope that there will be a better future for them. The expanded nutrition program has been a great help to the families. The 120 children receive food which cushions a part of the children's nutritional needs.

During the crises, many families do not have access to income, therefore it is difficult for them to buy food. The new family gardens program, led and built by women, have supplied certain vegetables (tomatoes, onions, pipianas and ayotes, etc) to the families that own them. For some families, the gardens have been so successful that the excess production has been sold in the community and even in the city of León. The testimony of an unemployed mother with two children confirmed the critical role the gardens can play when she told us that..." for three months the garden saved us - I had no income and I got sick, but we were able to survive with the garden harvest"

The work we are doing in these communities is having a positive impact on the lives of the people with whom we collaborate. All these achievements would be impossible without the support we receive from the North. For this we send our greatest thanks. But we still have more dreams to fulfill. The people of the communities fight daily just to maintain what little they already have. But they long for better education, improved food security, access to income and a decent life. With the support of each one of you, this becomes more achievable and less distant.

From León Nicaragua, we send you a big hug and our gratitude for all the solidarity.

Family Gardens: In 2020, due to government repression in Nicaragua and in response to the COVID economic crisis, the Women's Program pivoted to begin a Family Gardens Program in the community of Goyena. Led by women, the project supplies vegetables to families. They have managed to produce a surplus of cucumbers, tomatoes, onions, pipianas and ayotes that the women have been able to market both in the community and in the city of Leon.



Climate Organizing:

NHLSCP's New Haven Climate Movement project has been very busy working on electrification of City buildings, pushing a Climate Justice Schools project, and advocating for State Green New Deal type policies, with most of the energy and leadership coming from local youth.

Women's Health: Workshop for teen girls - pre COVID - led by NGO Ixchen Leon to train young people on sexual and reproductive health. Government repression has greatly limited advocacy and education related to women's rights, but the Program is now offering another series of trainings on domestic violence prevention.



2020 Project Changes



Climate Health Education Project: NHLSCP's Climate Health Education Project involves eight youth in seven high schools leading climate education webinars, events, and engagement with teachers and principals. While COVID presented significant challenges, CHEP was able to make progress at educating and engaging youth energy and talent.

New Troilo Well: Women leading well construction project - and unloading cement for well lining - in rural Troilo where access to water is very limited. The construction was funded in part by the Leon Metropolitan Rotary Club.







Afterschool Nutrition Program

Expansion: In response to schools being closed during the 2018 political crisis, NHLSCP started an Afteschool Program in Troilo. In 2020 the economic crisis inspired adding a meal program to help students and families struggling through the hardships. Below meals are prepared by mothers. Above, students burning off energy through interactive games.



expanded EcoStove program installed 15 stoves in family homes in 2020, reducing indoor pollution, saving families money, and reducing greenhouse gas emissions.

Staff Yara Perez (with helmet) says there are orders for another 30 stoves once we get funding for subsidies.
